Overview

During 2022 we felt we were a well respected group with our views and ideas being valued by all organisations who worked with us. Lots of people wanted to come and talk to us! There are currently 11 members of the group. The age of the current membership ranges from 13-25. Half of the members are on the autistic spectrum with the other members having varying physical and learning disabilities.

PGL Weekend with RYC

In February, we joined The Rutland Youth Council on our first ever residential trip. 6 members from RDYF attended!

As well as having fun, we also presented our #IncludeMe2 campaign to RYC so they had more awareness of how to involve us during the weekend and how to work with other people with SEND!

myView App

We have been working with RCC's Participation Officer to develop an app for children and young people with SEND. The idea of the app is to have all the information we need in one place. There is also a messaging feature so we can directly message our keyworkers. We named this #IncludeMe2 after our campaign.

Currently members from the forum are user testing the app before it goes live!

Keep Safe Places in Oakham

In the summer, we did a mystery shop of the Keep Safe Places in Oakham. We visited each place listed and spoke to the workers and Heed Safe Place

managers—we asked them what they already know about the scheme and what they would do if someone went in anxious.

Some places really impressed us but some didn't. We then shared our findings with Melody who has removed one Keep Safe Place and provided some training for others.

National involvement



Two members went down to London to a Participation Conference organised by Kids Charity and CDC where they discussed the barriers to good participation.

One of our members has been selected to join Flare which is a national group of young people who often work with the Department of Education to shape services for children and young people with SEND.
